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The Jewish Women Of Ravensbruck

On April 30, 1945, the Soviet Army liberated Ravensbrück. They found only 3,000 extremely ill women in the camp, because the Nazis had sent other remaining women on a death march. World War II saw 130,000 female prisoners pass through the gates of Ravensbrück — most of whom never walked back out. What's surprising is that a relatively small number of those women were Jewish. Surviving records suggest that during the camp's operating years (May of 1939 through April of 1945), only 26,000 of the inmates were Jewish.

The Jewish Women of Ravensbruck Concentration Camp

Among the Jewish women who survived and recorded their recollections on Ravensbrück (Saidel, 2004), no one arrived before the end of 1942. It is rare to find a Jewish survivor who arrived before 1943 or even during that year. The majority of the camp's Jewish survivors arrived after Auschwitz was evacuated in January 1945.

Another exciting chapter in the history of the Jewish women of Ravensbrück is the story of two relatively well-known socialist activists who were interned in the camp and made a significant contribution to the social leisure of the Jewish prisoners during the camp's first period of activity.

The most serious overcrowding occurred after the evacuation of Auschwitz in January 1945, when an unknown but significant number of Jewish women arrived at Ravensbrück. Toward the end of the war, transports from Auschwitz and other camps in the East increased the population to its maximum, some 32,000 women.

As the war escalated, the camp population expanded to include petty criminals, Gypsies and Jewish women. Inasmuch as the intent was to "cleanse" Germany of all Jews, for most Jewish women Ravensbrück was a stop-over. An estimated 26,000 Jewish women passed through or were murdered at this camp. One Ravensbruck inmate described the setting as stepping naked into a cage of wild animals. The women inmates of Ravensbruck lined up after a day of working in forced labor. Camp discipline was not only maintained by the vicious guards but also by fellow prisoners as well — by collaborators, kapos and block leaders [blockovas, as they were called]. They were as vile as the guards and were recruited because they share this same characteristic as well as the willingness to follow on orders.

Over the next two days, the SS transfers 1,000 women — mainly German Jewish women but also Romani (Gypsy) women — from Ravensbrück to Auschwitz - Birkenau in German-occupied Poland. The SS establishes a women's camp at Auschwitz-Birkenau. July 7, 1942 Almost 200 women arrive in Ravensbrück from the Czech village of Lidice.

Ravensbrück (pronounced [ʁaːvənsˈbʁʏk]) was a German concentration camp exclusively for women from 1939 to 1945, located in northern Germany, 90 km (56 mi) north of Berlin at a site near the village of Ravensbrück (part of Fürstenberg/Havel). The camp memorial's estimated figure of 132,000 women who were in the camp during the war includes about 48,500 from Poland, 28,000 from the Soviet Union, almost 24,000 from Germany and Austria, nearly 8,000 from France, and thousands from ...
